Dear Larry,

I'm writing to ask that you rein in the Mid Valley Disposal rate hike request that is to be discussed at a Board meeting on Tuesday, December 17.

I own a citrus ranch in Lemon Cove, and currently pay \$149.02/month for 1x weekly pickup of my 2 yard bin and 2x/month pickup of my recycling tote. The current cost includes 19% total increases since May of 2023. Now, Mid Valley is proposing that my monthly service should increase 31% to \$196.15/month effective April of 2025. If granted, this would represent a cumulative increases of 56% in 2 years! (\$125.19 prior to 2023 rate hike).

I understand that costs for just about everything increases; labor, fuel, equipment, etc. But a 31% increase? This, on top of 2 increases in the past 2 years, seems unreasonable. My income has certainly not increased by that percentage. What I am asking is that you and the other supervisors make Mid Valley demonstrate that their costs have increased over 50% in 2 years. These kinds of cost increases, especially for a monopoly business, make farming increasingly unsustainable.

As a side note, thank you Larry, for your visits to the Exeter Kiwanis club. I appreciate you updates and willingness to listen to your constituents!

Dear Board of Supervisors,

I understand extra costs involved in handling a separate waste stream for the disposal companies, mandated by SB1383. I also understand that yes, **aerobic** composting is better than anaerobic landfill decomposition. The trick is proper composting.

But making farms that compost on site, and homeowners that practice composting pay for a service that they don't/wont use is not fair. As a farmer, I already incur costs of shredding my tree prunings on site. Many homeowners practice composting for their home gardens, and have no use for a separate green waste bin. There should be an "opt out" for farms and residences that handle green waste on site through shredding and composting. The state should incentivize composting on site with rebates for shredders and composters as an alternative for Californians.

I received a notice from Mid Valley Disposal Thursday afternoon indicating the Board of Supervisors will hear the matter of Solid Waste Collection Rate Increases tomorrow morning at 9:30am (agenda item 5). The Rate Adjustment Calculation includes a voluntary 10% increase in residential Foothill Area automated rates for a single "Bear-Proof Can" with a \$12.00 charge for each additional can.

There are several issues with this proposal:

1. There was no community involvement. On July 9th, "Supervisor Vander Poel directed staff to bring an agenda item for all SRA residents to have bear cans for their waste." According to the Clerk of the Board, no agenda item was brought forward. Instead, according to Guillermo Hermoso at Tulare County Solid Waste, RMA simply instructed Solid Waste to include "Bear-Proof Cans" in the Rate Adjustment Calculation. Accordingly, Solid Waste purportedly contacted Mid Valley Disposal, who purportedly provided the proposed rates.

2. The solution does not meet community needs.

- The solution is not mandatory.
- There is no solution for STR and commercial customers. It is critically important that all the 1-6yd. metal curbside bins (including the so-called bear-proof bins) be removed, as a) they do not deter bears and b) they injure and kill bears.
- The solution is too expensive for residents who need multiple bear-resistant cans. Many of us will need a can for garbage and one for recycling, and those who put food waste in the organics can will need a third can. The proposal entails a 10% increase for one can, a 40% increase for two cans, and a 70% increase for three cans. During a call this morning, Mid Valley Disposal was unable to explain how they derived the rates, and it is uncertain that the rates take into account the volume discounts.
- The proposed rates purportedly do not take into account available grants.
- The solution does not include the critically-important education element.
- The solution does not include collaboration with the CSD, SEKI, and (potentially) SPC.
- It is unclear if or how the solution follows the best-practices proven effective in other communities. This morning, Mid Valley Disposal was unable to answer any of my questions regarding the manufacturer, model, features, and size of the cans. We need cans that have been proven effective against black bears and that automatically lock and unlock when tipped into a garbage truck.
- There is no provision to fine people who over-fill their cans or fail to use the bear-resistant containers.

As you know, there has been a devastating loss of bear habitat in recent years due to fires and fire mitigation strategies (including prescribed burns and ground cover removal). At the same time, we have seen a substantial increase in the number of STRs, which have challenges

managing their garbage effectively. As a result, bear-strewn trash has become commonplace, and there are reports of adverse human-bear interactions. If we do not solve this problem immediately, we are likely to find ourselves in an untenable situation like the one Lake Tahoe residents are currently in.



Honorable Supervisors:

As usual, Mid Valley's proposed rate increases (and especially the rates proposed for bear-resistant containers for residential Foothill Areas customers) completely exclude community involvement and education.

It is my understanding that in early July Supervisor Vander Poel directed staff to bring an agenda item for all SRA residents to have bear cans for their waste. According to the Clerk of the Board, that has never happened.

Apparently Guillermo Hermoso at Tulare County Solid Waste says RMA instructed Solid Waste to include "Bear-Proof Cans" in the Rate Adjustment Calculation. Solid Waste purportedly contacted Mid Valley Disposal, who purportedly provided the proposed rates.

All of that circumvents community input, including a full airing by way of an agenda item, as originally requested by the Board.

2. The proposed "solution" does not meet needs previously articulated by members of the community.

- Compliance is optional rather than mandatory.
- There is a complete lack of solutions directed at 1) Short Term Rentals (those homes are really more commercial than residential) and 2) commercial customers. As many have observed, it is critically important that all the bear-accessible 1-6 yd. metal curbside bins/dumpsters (including Mid Valley's so-called bear-proof bins) be replaced, as a) they do not effectively deter bears and b) they have **injured and killed bears**.
- The proposal is very expensive for those who need multiple bear-

resistant cans. Many of us need bear-proof cans for garbage, and for recycling, and we who put food waste in the organics can will need a third can. The proposal entails a 10% increase for one can, a 40% increase for two cans, and a 70% increase for three cans. During a call this morning, Mid Valley Disposal was unable to explain how they derived the rates, and it is uncertain that the rates take into account volume discounts (more than one at a single residence).

- The proposed rates purportedly do not take into account available grants.
- Unsurprisingly, the "solution" does not include the critically-important education element. The community (and its visitors, and newcomers as they arrive) must be given (and have easy access to on the Mid Valley website) explanations -- why bear-proofing matters, what's at stake, etc.
- I say unsurprisingly because I have repeatedly asked Mid Valley to tell the community (in a form more direct and interactive than an abbreviated insert with the bills) how we could do better at recycling. I have never received a response.
- Collaboration with crucial stakeholders (e.g., Community Services District, Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks, and the Bureau of Land Management) is entirely absent from this approach.
- It is unclear if or how the proposed "solution" follows the best-practices proven effective in other communities. This wheel does not have to be reinvented (and customers should not have to pay for a method that is experimental rather than proven). This morning, Mid Valley Disposal was unable to answer any questions regarding the manufacturer, model, features, and size of the cans they are proposing a surcharge for.

We need cans that have been proven effective against black bears and that automatically lock and unlock when tipped into a garbage truck.

This approach also lacks a provision to fine people who over-fill their cans or fail to use the bear-resistant containers.

Because of where I live I won't be at the meeting in person (as I have been in the past for Mid Valley rate increase agenda items). Please take the pleas of our residents seriously.

RE: December 17 2024 Agenda Item #5 - Solid Waste Department Request to Approve Franchise Hauler's Maximum Collection and Ancillary Rates Effective 4/1/2025 in Foothill Areas

Dear Supervisors:

Item 5 on this Agenda asks you to approve Franchise Hauler's maximum collection and ancillary rates per Exhibit B, effective April 1, 2025. The attached Exhibit shows in the Rate Adjustment Calculation for Residential in Foothill Areas and for Residential Ancillary Fees in All Areas an additional line item regarding Bear-Proof Cans.

For residences in the Foothill Areas, which would include all Three Rivers residences: "Bear-Proof Can (additional monthly surcharge) 10%." For Residential Ancillary Fees (All Areas): "Bear-Proof Can (additional monthly per Cart) \$12.00."

1. We strongly urge you to NOT approve these monthly charges for Bear-Proof Cans at this time for the following reasons. While on July 9, 2024, Supervisor Vander Poel directed staff to bring an agenda item for all SRA residents to have bear cans for their waste, we are not aware of such an item having appeared on a subsequent Board agenda, or of staff or Supervisors having communicated with the affected communities re the contents of such an item. Certainly, the Board is aware of the Three Rivers community's concerns about problems with bears and trash and the need for solutions to the problems, but surely this monthly charge for bear-proof cans can't be the Board's undiscussed, unexplained solution.

2. This monthly rate would be a hefty annual cost for many residents, especially those who are already paying for three separate cans to encourage recycling, but there has been no community outreach and involvement to explain the specifications on these cans that would ensure that they would be bear-proof and there is nothing to indicate that use of the bear-proof cans would be mandatory, so who is going to pay extra for these cans? OR must the additional monthly charge be paid by residents regardless of whether or not they want these "bear-proof" cans, or how many of them they want for their household.

3. The Commercial rates for the Foothills and elsewhere show NO additional monthly surcharge for bear-proof cans. Why would only residences be required to pay the additional charges? Are commercial sites not going to be required to use bear-proof containers? Are the Short Term Rental businesses (probably a chief source of bear/trash problems in Three Rivers) going to be considered as residences or as commercial establishments for purposes of these additional charges?

4. Please direct staff to prepare a clear, detailed plan for the implementation of bear-proof cans in Foothill communities. Plan preparation must include community input and feedback; specifications based on documented successful bear-proofing; procedures based on proven best practices in communities with similar bear/trash problem; whether the bear-proof cans will be mandatory for all trash/refuse or only some; how the community will be educated regarding the requirement for use of the bear-proof cans; how use, misuse, or failure to use will be monitored; and what penalties will be enforced for misuse or failure to use as required. (Are grants available to help with this process and the plan's implementation and ongoing costs to residents?)

5. Please engage the Three Rivers community in at least one initial public meeting, with open opportunities for follow-up, so that the community's experiences and needs can be fully understood and staff's planning can be shown to meet these needs. As the southern gateway to Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks, Three Rivers is home to abundant wildlife, including numerous hungry bears, especially at certain times of the year, and is also home to hundreds of short-term rentals, most of whose clients and many of whose managers seem either ignorant of or unconcerned about how their trash mis-handling can cause many problems for bears and for their neighbors.

Thank you for considering these requests and urgings and for providing a solid, effective, and cost-effective plan for solving these long-term, on-going bear/trash problems. We look forward to working with you on this plan and its implementation.

Dear Tulare County Board of Supervisors,

In the fall of 2025, it will mark 10 years since I began actively working toward bear-proofing Three Rivers. From traveling to the far reaches of this rural community to retrofit Mid Valley's plastic trash cans with bear-deterrent hardware to providing education and resources on how to coexist with bears as the editor of the Three Rivers weekly newspaper, I have tirelessly advocated for keeping human garbage away from bears — for the safety of both residents and wildlife.

Back in 2015, I was informed by the then-county supervisor that Mid Valley Disposal was “under a long-term contract” and that no changes could or would be made by either the County of Tulare or the solid waste contractor. Fast forward to now: with only three working days' notice, Three Rivers residents were informed that a new contract with Mid Valley Disposal that reflects across-the-board price increases was going before the Board of Supervisors, presumably for a rubber-stamp approval.

The lack of transparency in this decision is deeply concerning, particularly as the contract is now being extended to 2039. Does this mean the contract will never again be open for competitive bidding? Will there ever be an opportunity to choose a solid waste company that prioritizes addressing the unique challenges our community faces, such as the pressing issue of human-bear conflicts?

I urge you to table this contract and its associated rate increases until Mid Valley Disposal and the County of Tulare commit to making bear-proofing Three Rivers a mandatory priority. This is not just an environmental concern—it's a public safety imperative.

The argument that dumpsters are a viable alternative is flawed. Bears have demonstrated their ability to breach dumpsters, which are not only unsightly but also pose significant safety risks. Placed near highways, these large receptacles are potential hazards. A bear could easily topple one onto the roadway, or a distracted driver could collide with a dumpster that's too close to the road — resulting in serious injuries or even fatalities. At the very least, and as an immediate measure, reflective tape should be added to all dumpsters to improve visibility and mitigate these dangers.

Three Rivers deserves better. We need a waste management solution that prioritizes safety, accountability, and sustainability. Bear-proof trash receptacles are a critical step in that direction, and the County of Tulare, along with Mid Valley Disposal, must take responsibility for implementing this solution.

I appreciate your attention to this matter and look forward to seeing meaningful action taken to protect both the residents and wildlife of Three Rivers.

Dear Tulare County Board of Supervisors,

I am writing to express my concerns about the "bear-proof cans" included in the rate adjustment notice I have received from Tulare County Solid Waste. If this is the proposed solution to the foothills challenges with bears constantly getting into garbage containers, it falls far short of what is needed, and lacks community engagement and input, is potentially costly to customers, and does not even attempt to engage local partners, seek outside funds, or research what has worked well in other communities with similar issues.

I was at the July 9th Board of Supervisors meeting where Supervisor Vander Poel directed staff to bring an agenda item for all SRA residents for their waste. I have never seen that this agenda item has been brought forward nor has there been meaningful engagement with community foothill residents and local organizations most affected by this issue.

There are numerous needs that have been brought forward previously that have not been addressed by this proposed solution:

- Bear-proof garbage containers are not mandatory. They must be if communities are going to have effective resolution of this issue.
- Nothing was proposed to address the needs of short-term rentals (that have the most issues with preventing bears from getting garbage) or local businesses.
- It is unclear that any research was done to select trash containers that are actually bear-proof. The current metal bins and dumpsters do not work (bears are even breaking into ones that have the bar in place). And worse, they have also injured bears, and part of the goal here is to protect bears from harm as well as keep residents safe. What is the intended storage solution that is being proposed?
- The proposal is expensive, especially for those who may need multiple bear-resistant cans (for garbage, organics, and possibly even recycling).
- There appears to have not been an effort made to seek grants that could reduce the cost.
- There was no mention of collaboration with important local partners, some of whom have expertise in bear management and effective trash storage (especially Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks, Sequoia National

Forest, the Bureau of Land Management, and the Community Services District).

- What about an education component - for both residents and those who come as tourists - addressing why bear-proof food storage is needed and how it must be done to be effective?
- There are no consequences when people overfill trash containers or do not correctly use those that are meant to be bear-proof. See the photo below of one of the supposed bearproof containers broken into by a bear on the Mineral King Road, despite the bar being in place.

My name is John Van Hofwegen and I live just southwest of Exeter 18020 Ave 256. I've operated a small business manufacturing custom cabinets at this address for nearly 34 years. I operate here under the use of a special use permit granted by the county for which I'm grateful. We use a commercial dumpster from waste management as prescribed and it has worked really well over the years. My concern is that our rates, which are approved by the county, keep going up as often as twice a year! I totally understand how things go up like insurance and labor. This although is getting out of hand. We just got notice of the public meeting Dec 17 - yesterday. So my schedule doesn't allow me to get to the meeting on short notice. Also the letter doesn't give any reason whatsoever on why the rate is going up. If we At least we're given that it'd help us feel better about these rate hikes as you are approving them. Business people usually do. But not just getting constant rate hikes fired at us. For you as a supervisor this should be clear in your mind to communicate with the area of your district- you were elected to help your people be aware of what is happening. I believe you owe it to those who faithfully vote for you. Costs are rising I understand but we need at least some sort of explanation before rate hikes are initiated.
